# **Committee Reports**

#### Building and Maintenance Larry Saslaw/ Irvin Pike

The buildings have been in a relatively static state with heating and cooling systems requiring the most attention. Several classroom units have needed repairs and the library/CBJ room will require heating unit maintenance prior to next winter. The roof remains in good condition with the vinal coverings intact. The Torah Learning Center classrooms are scheduled to be painted this June and July. The sewer pipe under the social hall will require repair this next year. The California Office of Emergency Services security grant projects are proceeding with the perimeter fencing and gates, camera and lighting installations, contracted security services occurring each Shabbat and special occasions, and bids are being acquired for some exterior window replacements, window film installation, and protection of the sanctuary stained glass. A solar parking lot car port has been approved by PG&E and engineering for the supports are in design. Donations, savings from the existing electric costs within the utilities budget, and deferred financing payments have enabled this project to proceed. Bright Beginnings has recently had new bark and sand installed in the playground. The gardener recently repaired the sprinkler system as the summer irrigation had begun. An agreement has been approved between TBE and Congregation B'nai Jacob for CBJ to rent the previous "youth lounge" room to keep their aron kodesh and sefer torahs, have a meeting/learning place, library, and storage space for the foreseeable future or until they find a new home.

#### Caring Committee. Laura Lauria

The goal of the Caring Committee is to create an atmosphere within the Temple, so that we can become a community of people who reach out to one another with care and affection. Our volunteers reach out to Temple members in need of a kind word and a willing ear. We hope by providing a friendly voice, we can offer care, concern, and good wishes. The Caring Committee provides support and assistance to members of our congregation at various times of need. Services may include bereavement support, hospital or home visits, phone calls, cards and letters, and transportation assistance for a fellow congregant to Temple, a medical appointment, or an errand. The committee reaches out to members to offer support, reassurance, and a friendly "hello" and to let members know the Temple is thinking of them. Friendly notes and a phone call to stay in touch with members we do not see as often as we used to provides comfort to our congregants. Committee members are caring congregants who think of the Temple as family. Through the caring committee, we can make a positive difference in a Jewish person's life.
