

Things I Learned While in Israel During a War

Returning from Israel with Temple Beth El's President Avital Anders after a week of volunteering, in response to the October 7th murder, rape, torture and kidnappings there, I find myself reflecting on several new insights gained upon witnessing firsthand the terrible anguish Israelis are feeling. Over 1200 people murdered, mostly civilians butchered by Hamas; they continue to pray for the return of roughly 240 hostages. The trip resulted in four epiphanies:

First, Israelis are resilient. This courageous nation of immigrants, bludgeoned by decades of Hamas killing sprees including the ruthless invasion of October 7th, is unified in their resolve to eliminate the Hamas threat, once and for all. Only months ago, hundreds of thousands of Israelis took to the streets to oppose Prime Minister Netanyahu's efforts to reform the Israeli judicial system; now they rally together to confront the Hamas menace, head-on. Posters of the kidnapped are EVERYWHERE; ubiquitous signs exclaim ניבוח ("Together we shall overcome." Israeli flags adorn nearly every lamppost; supermarkets and banks add their own messages of unity. Israelis reiterate, as the popular song goes, "Ein Li Eretz Acheret:" "I have no other land." This society of Holocaust survivors and Israeli war veterans will fight to the very end for their right to be an Am Chofshi b'Artzam, a free nation in their land. Their authentic patriotism surpasses anything I have seen anywhere else in the world. Giving lifesaving blood on our last day there, I am committed to share whatever fate may be Israel's, and I am not alone.

Second, Israelis uniformly reject the rising tide of worldwide anti-Semitism, especially prevalent in the US. Calling Israel's actions "genocide," or its existence "colonization," is toxic, confusing nonsense. Nothing comes close to the systematic attempt at murdering every Jew only 75 years ago, and leveling this ugly trope against citizens of the sole majority Jewish state which everyone knows suffered genocidal efforts is ironic, cruel. Is it any surprise, in the wake of the Holocaust, that Israelis will fight like hell? Nevertheless, the Israelis that I met or know pray for peace even while they are at war. They know the threat from Hamas is an existential one, with communal memories of Auschwitz and Treblinka to boot. Thus, reports of anti-Israel rallies and recent killings of American Jews, including a synagogue President and a SoCal activist, rattle them just as much as Gazan rockets. Jews will forever be perplexed by Jew hatred, but unlike sheep led to slaughter, we will boldly demand "Never again." Third, the link between Israel and Palestinians is essential to both peoples. Avital and I filled in for Gazans who, until Hamas indiscriminately murdered Jewish, Arab, and Thai field workers, worked fields and groves next to Gaza in Israel proper. Harvesting lettuce, celery, avocadoes, parsley, and tomatoes, we knew that 20,000 Gazans would enter Israel daily to earn a paycheck but are now prevented from entering Israel due to the war; we volunteered to ensure that Israelis still have food. In fact, the "Michaeli Farm" where we volunteered was originally in Gaza; Israel unilaterally withdrew in 2005 and Michaeli farm thus relocated into Israel but maintained many of its Palestinian workers. In such close range, we heard countless rockets launched or taken down by Iron Dome. We hit the ground immediately in the lettuce greenhouse when the siren went off indicating an incoming rocket attack. Picking cherry tomatoes, we saw smoke rising up from Gaza. Nevertheless, we hope for the reinstitution of all that was working between Israelis and Palestinians, and there was plenty of good prior to October 7th. The interconnectedness of Israelis and Palestinians living in Gaza will remain a fact on the ground; any future peace agreement must include economic partnership between these two peoples.

Fourth and most importantly, the United States remains a critical partner for Israel. Whether it be the US-funded Iron Dome mobile defense system, America's promise to enter the war if Hezbollah or Iran fully attack Israel, or the more subtle "thank you's" we received from Israelis feeling grateful that President Biden has demonstrated commitment to Israel's survival, Israel relies on us. This was true in 1973 during the Yom Kippur War; it remains true in 2023 during this Hamas War. As American Jews worry about Israel's fate and as we fight to protect Israel's reputation as an Or L'goyim—a light unto the nations—one thing is clear: Israel remains a priceless partner in the furtherance of worldwide democracy and serves as a land of innovation and blessing not only for Jews, but for the world as a whole.

My community at Temple Beth El will continue to pray for Israel's survival, alongside several churches who we thank for their indefatigable support, and I ask you to do the same: <u>Join us at the Liberty Bell on Monday, December 4th at 5:30pm</u> for a reading of Israeli hostages; support Israel with tax-deductible donations (<u>www.tinyurl.com/For-Israel</u>); ask your Jewish friends how they are managing; and consider volunteering in Israel. I'd be happy to join you, too.

fun when we are together, and we ease the worry and pain that we journey through when we are with each other. Those of us who are 'regulars' at Shabbat services experience the soul nourishing connectedness of community every week. I am so grateful to be a part of us. I find that being together sustains me. So, I keep showing up.

The photo attached is from a recent event put on by RiverLakes Community Church in support of Israel. I debated if I should participate, but ultimately, I am glad I did. It is important to use our voice. As we proudly retell the story of Chanukah, we recognize that *our time is now*. This is our time to stand up for ourselves and our people.






