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LETTER FROM THE RABBI

Partners in Spirit Rabbi Jonathan Klein

What does it mean to be an ally? When the going gets tough, do the tough get going, or do they say, " Where you shall go, I shall go," the biblical Ruth's words to her mother-in-

law Naomi under difficult circumstances? Is our commitment to one another "in sickness and in health, for richer and for poorer, in good times and in bad?" In the world

of ideas, can two religious communities find common ground, despite radically different theologies, or better yet, partner to make a difference? It turns out we can.

Allyship is hard to come by, even more difficult to maintain. The ever-growing gap and non-collaborative chasm between Democrats and Republicans make even mere conversation strained. Purity tests, simplistic assumptions, obsessions with every element of another's agenda—or what the rabbis call sinat chinam, or gratuitous hatred—these lead to the dissolution of shared space, pariah institutions, and left without

attention, political and sometimes even physical violence. Sheesh, it sure feels like we are living in the wake of the Big Bang, our life force and energy just dissipating and disappearing into the void. William Butler Yeats, in his poem, "The Second Coming," describes this apocalypse:

"Things fall apart; the center cannot hold; Mere anarchy is loosed upon the world..."

So when a Bakersfield Christian community is vandalized for its commitment to the Jewish homeland, and instead of hiding decides to double down to provide free security for our little Bakersfield synagogue, one must adjust their thinking to CELEBRATE that those on the other side of whatever dividing line there is—in this instance, a religious one —are wonderful people who deserve our praise for recognizing our humanity andfragility, and for suspending any human tendency to highlight differences when, instead, they are "all in" on a shared love for Israel.

When Pastor Brandon Holthaus of Rock Harbor Church sat down with me, after the October 2023 Hamas murder spree in Israel, to offer his community's security detail to protect us, I discovered in my esteemed religious colleague a partner filled with sensitivity, intellect, and unmitigated kindness, who with pure intentions wanted to defend us from danger. Our synagogue accepted this gift to shield the Jewish people from misfortune in our little Bakersfield community. So, to all the good people at Rock Harbor Church, who have contributed tens of thousands of dollars to protect Jews, not just locally but also in Israel, we say, Todah Rabbah, thank you from the bottom of our hearts!



Pastor Holthaus and I occasionally touch on political matters—treading lightly, out of respect and deference—and I think we would both acknowledge that we may hold slightly different views about how Israel should manage itself and, probably by extension, how the United States should respond in this moment. I have strong commitments, like most Jews, to protecting the poor, immigrant rights, and how best to build a just and sacred society; Pastor Holthaus, too, holds his own passionate perspectives, with very similar goals. We undoubtedly have differences, at the very least theologically. Yet, while Pastor Holthaus and his community see things differently than my community and I do (which is a safe thing to say; which two thinking people hold identical views?), I know that we have found friends, allies, and trusted partners willing to put their life and limb in the way of those who would hurt us. This is particularly remarkable, given the history of Jewish-Christian relations, both Protestant and Catholic. The good people at Rock Harbor Church are not trying to change us, they are only trying to support us in our time of need, at a time when the zeitgeist of the era prevents handshakes across aisles. This is remarkable, and why this tale of collaboration and friendship deserves public accolades and.

Is there a lesson here? Can we seek common ground despite our differences? Our world feels more fragile than ever, certainly within my lifetime. May the blessings bestowed upon the Jewish community by our Christian neighbors at Rock Harbor Church remind us of our shared humanity, the value of unconditional love, and that things can most certainly get better if we just reach out to one another, even unilaterally, without expectations of returns, resulting in the creation of our very own heaven on earth. To Rock Harbor Church, I say: Be blessed, and continue to be a blessing for our diverse community!

Words do matter

Words are not neutral. They shape public perception, influence action, and, in moments of crisis, determine the moral direction of societies. In Judaism, speech is seen as sacred, a divine gift that has the power to create, to con nect, and, when misused, to destroy.

The Torah begins with this principle. In the Torah portion of Bereishis, (Genesis) God creates the world through speech. "And God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light." This foundational act teaches that language is not merely a form of expression, it is a tool of creation. It is no coincidence that human beings, alone among creations, were endowed with intelligent, articulate speech. Judaism takes words seriously. We are taught that lashon hara, destructive speech, is akin to shedding blood.

History has shown us just how true this is. The Holocaust did not begin with gas chambers; it ended with them. Long before the first train reached Auschwitz, Nazi leaders saturated German society with propaganda, carefully crafted lies that cast Jews as parasites, threats and scapegoats for Germany's decline. A false narrative was repeated until it was accepted as truth. The result: the industrialized murder of six million Jews and millions of others.

To define this atrocity, the word genocide was coined in 1944 by Polish-Jewish lawyer Raphael Lemkin. Combining the Greek word genos (race or tribe) and the Latin -cide (killing), Lemkin sought to name the systematic eradication of entire peoples, specifically referencing the Nazi campaign of extermination against Jews, Roma, the disabled, and others. The word carries the weight of unimaginable suffering. It must not be used lightly.

And yet, in 2025, this word is being weaponized and used as its own form of warfare.

Across global media and activist circles, Israel is being accused of committing genocide in its war with Hamas. This is not just a mischaracterization, it is a gross distortion. Hamas, a terrorist organization whose founding charter calls for Israel's destruction, launched a barbaric attack on Oct. 7, 2023, murdering, raping and kidnapping Israeli civilians in the worst mass killing of Jews since the Holocaust. Israel's military response is not only lawful, but also necessary. It is a war of survival.

To accuse Israel of genocide while it defends itself from annihilation is both immoral and intellectually dishonest. If that accusation were applied fairly, then every nation that has ever fought a war, including the United States in World War II, Britain in the Falklands, NATO in Kosovo, and Ukraine today, would be guilty of the same.

Worse still, many of these accusations are rooted in data provided by Hamas itself, data that has since been discredited. The numbers, widely circulated in media reports, were unverified and inflated, calculated to provoke outrage and paint Israel as the aggressor. Accepting these figures without scrutiny is not reporting; it is propaganda, most of all it's a mod ern-day blood libel. These blood libels spread as follows: Hamas terrorists fabricate anti-Israel data. It's reported to the world by the "Gaza Health Ministry," aka Hamas. It is then parroted without qualification by the UN. It is quickly ampli fied by news media without verification. It is then spread across social media by eager anti-Israel users. Hamas is encouraged by the successful communications strategies and renews its spread of anti-Israel data, creating a new vicious cycle of propaganda.

It's also an insult to the memory of the victims of actual genocides. In true genocides, the targeted populations did not experience population growth during the campaign against them. Their supposed oppressors didn't deliver tons of food and aid to the very people they were allegedly trying to annihilate. In addition, the victims of true genocides certainly weren't offered the chance to end the violence by releasing hostages or laying down their arms. Comparing these situ ations dilutes the meaning of genocide and dishonors those who suffered through its horrors.

Let us be clear: Israel is not committing genocide. And those who claim otherwise, particularly while relying on false data and ignoring context, are not pursuing human rights. They are advancing a political agenda; one often fueled by centuries-old antisemitic tropes.

This isn't abstract for me. It is personal. The lived experience as a Jew is this: We are called "murderer" in the streets. Our Jewish centers are defaced with hateful messages wishing for our demise. Our children are harassed as they walk to school. Nearly every article online about Jews, regardless of the topic, is flooded with hateful comments accusing us of the vilest accusations laced with age-old antisemitic tropes. When posting online about our Jewish Deli Night at the Chabad Jewish Center, advertising a Kosher pastrami sandwich, we were privileged to many of those hateful and ludicrous responses. This slander has been normalized. And with normalization comes the danger of dehumanization. The accusation of genocide, so detached from reality, has become a license for harassment, threats and violence against Jews around the world. This lie caused the murder of two beautiful young people shot down in the prime of their life. Shot dead in Washington, D.C., at a Jewish event; their crime, their support of Israel.

It also motivated a deranged individual to firebomb a group of Jews in Boulder, Colo.

Their crime: marching for the awareness of the 55 hostages still being held by Hamas terrorists, severely injuring an elderly Holocaust survivor and other innocent individuals.

The lie has been repeated so often, people no longer flinch when it's spoken. But I still do. And I will not be silent in the face of it.

Because silence is how it spreads. And only education can break the cycle.

Education means understanding that words have the power to shape history, for good or for evil. It means recognizing when dangerous patterns begin to repeat. When a society grows comfortable believing the worst about Jews, when mis information is weaponized against Israel, and when antisemitic rhetoric reenters the mainstream, we must speak out, not just for the sake of the Jewish people, but for the sake of all humanity.

At the Central Valley Holocaust Memorial, we are doing just that, inviting and educating thousands of local students about the past, the dangers of hate and propaganda, and how to recognize and speak out against it.

Antisemitism is never just a Jewish problem. Once it takes root, it marks the beginning of a society's moral unraveling and often signals its eventual downfall.

Words matter. Spoken in truth, they can build, protect and heal. Twisted into lies, they can destroy and kill. Let's stop the lies. Let's stop the hate. Be a part in helping to educate our future generation of leaders. Before it escalates again.




